#### Message from the Minister

Throughout this Lenten season we've been studying Marcus Borg's new book "**Convictions: How I Learned What Matters Most**. One of Borg's biggest convictions is that Christianity is about how we as followers of Jesus experience transformation right here and now.

As we look forward to the Easter season I hear much of that same sentiment in the words of Joan Chittister, another of St. Andrew's favourites when she writes this about the resurrection.

"To say I believe in Jesus Christ . . . who rose from the dead,' is to say I believe that the Resurrection goes on and on and on forever. Every time Jesus rises in our own hearts in new ways, the Resurrection happens again. Every time we see Jesus where we did not recognize him before — in the faces of the poor, in the love of the unloved, in the revelatory moments of life, Jesus rises anew. The real proof of the Resurrection lies not in the transformation of Jesus alone but in the transformation awaiting us who accept it. Until we find ourselves with new hearts, more penetrating insights, fewer compulsions, less need for the transient, greater awareness of the spiritual pulse of life, resurrection has not really happened for us. Jesus has risen but we have not. Resurrection is change at the root of the soul. It marks a whole new way of being in life."

We have been transformed, and transforming a lot at St. Andrew's over the last little while. We've seen increased participation in our worship and music leadership, the growth of our Sunday morning children's program into two groups, the doubling of the size of the community children's garden, and the desire of the Ebenezer United Church to join with us are all signs of the transformation within our midst--not to mention the tremendous efforts of our Long Range Planning Task Group to ensure the long-term viability of our ministry. We are doing all this in faith-not the faith that some way things will work out, but the faith that our response to the transformation of Jesus through the resurrection transforms us as well. As we look to the Easter season, and the days that lie beyond it, may the presence of the resurrected be the power that sustains us all. Happy Easter!

**Children's Program:** What a great past few months we have had! The children participated in a messy (but fun) pumpkin carving contest, An Advent event (where they got to meet Santa) and our monthly Family Movie nights! We have had so much fun in class, doing everything from arts and crafts, and baking to gardening and relay races! Our class focuses mainly on God's love and all the different ways in which we can share it. We spend a lot of time encouraging inclusiveness and sharing (not only our toys, but our talents/gifts).

Every third Friday of the month we host a Family Movie night. The Children (and some adults) come in their jammies, bring their favourite blankie, and snuggle up with their parents and friends and enjoy the movie! We serve popcorn, cheese puffs, juice, and hot chocolate. It is a free night for families to get out of the house and spend time together and with their friends. (Doors open at 6:45pm and we start the movie at 7:00pm)

This year we have some very exciting activities lined up! We will be



planting a garden once again this spring/summer. However this year we are doubling the size of it and have purchased and built a plant stand with a UV light system that will allow us to get started on some growing right away indoors. We are hoping to have two harvesting seasons this summer/fall. During the summer we run our Sunday morning children's program outside

in the garden enjoying and caring for God's gifts.

During the months of July and August, we will be having four special nights for families and all who wish to join. We are hosting campfire nights, where we will gather outside around a campfire and sing some songs, play guitars, do some skits and tell some stories. We will have marshmallows for roasting and chocolate bars and graham crackers for s'mores! It will be a great deal of fun! And if you are so inclined, bring your own guitar, or hand drum! The nights of our campfires will take place on, July 11 and 28 and August 8 and 22 at 7:00pm.

Worship Committee: The well-planned, coordinated Sunday services don't happen by accident. Every month the worship committee meets to look ahead at the work of the church and Geoff and Helve meet frequently with other staff as well to reflect the season of the church year and plan for meaningful worship. With Sheila Brown as chair, and other hard-working members, we thank the worship committee for all they do!

**Film Club:** Reserve your calendar for a great night out on the first Friday of each month, starting at 7:30 p.m. (except for our summer break), and be prepared to be surprised, inspired, and entertained.

This year, Film Club is continuing its tradition of enjoying an eclectic mix of films ranging from dramas and comedies to documentaries. As part of our recent season, we have marvelled at the incredible performance of Judi Dench in the moving film, Philomena; laughed at the antics of the Newfoundland outport community in the Canadian comedy, The Grand Seduction; grooved to Motown music featured in The Sapphires; and watched the amazing, stranger-than-fiction story of an unknown American musician-philosopher in the documentary Searching for Sugarman.

Selections being considered for upcoming film nights are The Theory of Everything (about physicist Stephen Hawking and featuring an Oscarwinning performance for best male actor) and Walking the Camino, a delightful documentary following people along the pilgrimage route in northern Spain. Film Club is BYOJF – Bring Your Own Junk Food! Note -- April's film club meeting will be moved to the second Friday (April 10) due to Good Friday.

**Book Club:** The lively group that meets to discuss books on the second Thursday of each month is known for its good conversations and digressions into many different topics. Book club follows a successful formula where a wide variety of titles are selected each year. For our 2014-15 season a meeting was devoted to First Nations work -- the riveting Indian Horse by Richard Wagamese and The Inconvenient Indian by Thomas King. The club also enjoyed a great historic fiction selection -- Kisiskaciwan by Vernon Wishart, whose sister-in-law is in the book club. In honour of Mary Woodbury, the novelist and poet who started our book club, book club members choose a young reader's work each year, and this year novels by Edmonton author Dianne Linden were featured, including On Fire.

A mystery or two is always a must-read for the club, and our





There are many opportunities to be involved in music at St. Andrew's, whether it's singing on selected Sundays in the chorale, playing hand bells or hand chimes, hand drumming, playing guitar, or one of many brass instruments. Rehearsals

are on Wednesday evenings. Newly added are drop-in ukulele classes on Friday mornings. Our music director Helve knows how to get the best out of all accompaniments! And the fellowship and teamwork required as we make beautiful music together is one of the bonuses of participating in the activity. Carefully chosen hymns reflect contemporary and traditional themes and everyone is welcome to sing along.

**LONG RANGE PLANNING UPDATE:** In spite of concerns about attendance, a deficit budget and our beautiful sanctuary needing expensive upgrades, which we cannot presently afford, the St. Andrew's congregation has purposefully chosen not to move on a downward spiral to closure but to create a new vision for the future. In light of that decision, the Long Range Planning Group with assistance from consultant, Joel Den Han, has assessed the situation as an opportunity to create a new reality at our present location. Initial plans for action based on using the least amount of St. Andrew's Capital were presented at the Annual Meeting on March 8. Our aim is to:

- 1. Sell some of the south portion of St. Andrew's land for cash. The Memorial Garden will be respectfully relocated.
- 2 Create a suitable and operationally efficient church space with no debt, using the money obtained from land sale and partnering with a developer.
- 3 Create a long-term income stream for St. Andrew's through a business plan based on a Holding Company.

We will maintain ultimate control over the building and land in which the new church facility resides. The business model will be a simple corporation, mandated to develop and manage the project so maintenance and repairs will not be our responsibility. Church volunteers will not be in charge of new construction, as we will partner with a professional Developer/Development Manager providing access to expertise and financing. Going forward, we will work only with a selected development firm willing to build a business model tailored to our needs.

The committee is presently creating proposals for a new wider ministry at St. Andrew's and seeking funds from Edmonton Presbytery, Alberta and Northwest Conference and the National Church, who will also be involved in developing bylaws for the new corporation. Retaining United Church control and participation in the Holding Company ensures that our mission and outreach to the community remains the focus of the project.

The planning group pledges to continually strive to be faithfully stewards of St. Andrew's building and land resources as we actualize the new vision. 




